# Notifiable infectious diseases online notification form: Frequently Asked Questions

An **online notification form** for clinicians to report notifiable infectious diseases and related conditions to the WA Department of Health is now available.

#### How do I access the new online notification form?

The online notification form can be accessed via the following link: <a href="https://redcap.link/wa-disease-notification-form">https://redcap.link/wa-disease-notification-form</a>.

How does the new online notification form differ from the paper-based notification form? The most significant changes to the new online notification form are the removal of the requirement for a clinician's signature on the form, and the ability to immediately submit the notification to the Department of Health. Clinicians must continue to notify **urgently** notifiable infectious diseases by **phone** to their local <u>public health unit</u>, or the on-call public health physician via 1800 434 122 if after-hours.

# Can I access a hardcopy of the submitted form?

There is an option to download a PDF copy of the completed notification form at the time of submission. Alternatively, you can download a PDF copy at a later date using a return code issued at the time of submission.

# Can I print a copy of the submitted form?

The online form replaces the need to fax or mail a printed form. However, there is an option to download and print a PDF copy of the completed notification form at the time of submission. Note that any text outside of the field containers on the PDF form will **not** be printed.

#### Can I save a draft and return to it later?

As drafts cannot be saved, all required information should be collected before filling out the online notification form.

#### Will I receive confirmation once the form is submitted?

A confirmation email will be sent to the email address provided in the "Notifier details" section of the online notification form.

## Can I edit a form after submission?

No, once the form has been submitted it cannot be edited.

#### Can I still use existing methods of notification?

While existing methods of notification (mail and fax) remain available, clinicians are encouraged to notify electronically. Clinicians must continue to notify urgently notifiable

infectious diseases (only) by **phone** either to their local <u>public health unit</u>, or to the on-call public health physician via 1800 434 122 after-hours.

# Is patient information secure in the online form?

The form is hosted on REDCap, a secure data collection platform that complies with data protection and security protocols. The REDCap database is supported by the Information and System Performance Directorate Data and Information Systems. See <u>REDCap Governance</u> for further information.

# What should I do if the online notification form is not working and who do I contact for technical support?

For any issues or assistance, please contact <a href="mailto:EpiSurvControl@health.wa.gov.au">EpiSurvControl@health.wa.gov.au</a>. If the online notification form is unavailable, other methods such as mail or fax can still be used – PDF versions of the forms are still available for <a href="mailto:metropolitan">metropolitan</a> and <a href="mailto:regional">regional</a> areas (see <a href="mailto:contact details">contact details</a> for regional public health units). Only <a href="mailto:urgently">urgently</a> notifiable infectious diseases need to be phoned through.

Are medical and nurse practitioners legally required to notify the Department of Health about suspected infectious diseases?

Under the <u>Public Health Act 2016</u> and <u>Public Health Regulations 2017</u>, medical and nurse practitioners in Western Australia are legally required to notify the WA Department of Health if they suspect a patient has a notifiable infectious disease or related condition.
